Funeral & Memorials Terminology

A few things to consider about honoring the deceased and the living.

Funeral and memorial traditions provide ways for families and communities to honor a life, share memories, and support one another. These terms describe common services and practices you may encounter.

Death Notice

 A short announcement of a person's death, usually including service details

Obituary

 A longer written tribute, often in newspapers or online, that shares life details, accomplishments, and service information

Viewing / Visitation / Wake

 A time for family and friends to gather, pay respects, and support one another (may include the body).

Funeral Service

 A service held with the body present to commemorate and honor the deceased, often including particular cultural or religious traditions or customs

Graveside / Committal Service

• A service held at the burial site, often including prayers or words of commitment

Memorial Service

 A ceremony held without the body present to honor and remember the deceased

Celebration of Life

 A gathering that focuses on sharing stories, gratitude, and positive memories of the person's life

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Memorial (Monument or Marker)

• A headstone, bench, statue, or other marker placed in memory of a loved one

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Death Rituals

 Varying cultural and religious traditions or practices that honor the deceased and provide comfort and structure for the grieving community



Funeral Celebrant

- A person who helps plan and officiate a funeral service or ceremony
- This person may or may not be a minister, funeral director, or professional celebrant
